<b>Alaska</b>	Health care providers and laboratories	All BLL must be reported. <b>Idaho</b>	Health care providers	All BLL $\geq$ 5 ug/dL must be reported.	Within 3 working days	Clinicians report (usually by fax) to Health Districts. Health Districts report to ID Department of Health and Welfare.	1-800-445-8647 or 208-334-0614
<b>Oregon</b>	Clinicians and laboratories	All BLL must be reported.	Within 1 working day: all BLLs $\geq$ 5 ug/dL  Within 7 working days: all other BLLs	For BLLs $\geq$ 5 ug/dL: fax <a href="#">Elevated Blood Lead Test Reporting Form</a> to Oregon Health Authority (971-673-0457)  All other BLLs: Electronic Lab Reporting (ELR), fax, to secure email to Oregon Health Authority.	971-673-0440
<b>Washington</b>	Laboratories, or provider if a point of care lead measurement device is used	All BLL must be reported.	Within 2 days: BLLs greater than or equal to 5 ug/dL in children or 10 ug/dL or greater in adults  Within 1 month: all other BLLs	Use either <a href="#">Electronic Lab Reporting through PHRED HL7</a> or the <a href="#">Blood Lead Test Report Form</a> .
